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In the Spotlight



Professor Colin Gordon is one of the principal authors of <u>The City</u> of St. Louis Reparations Commission Final Report (October 2024). The report assesses the historical and ongoing racial injustices experienced by Black residents of St. Louis.

The Conference on Latin American History (CLAH), affiliated with AHA, awarded **Professor Viridiana Hernandez Fernandez** the 2024 Paul Vanderwood prize for the best article on Latin American history published in a journal other than the Hispanic American Historical Review. This is the second award for her article, "The March of Empire: The Californian Quest for Avocados in Twentieth-Century Mexico."





Professor Ashley Howard has been selected to receive the May Brodbeck Humanities Fellowship for 2025-26. This faculty fellowship, named in honor May Brodbeck who served as vice president for academic affairs and dean of faculties at the UI from 1974-1981, provides an opportunity for a current lowa scholar to contribute to their own field of study.

Jeremy Kingsbury (PhD, 2023) recorded a couple "additional voices" for <u>Anangong Miigaading</u>, the Ojibwe Language dub of Star Wars Episode IV: A New Hope. The movie was released in select theaters this summer and is coming soon to Disney+.





Professor Stephen Warren gave the keynote address, "From the Fort Gower Resolves to the Ohio Company: Indigenous Sovereignty and the Legal Fictions of Revolutionary America," at the Southeast Ohio History Conference on November 8th in Athens, Ohio.

Professor Nick Yablon received the Wyeth Foundation for American Art Publication Grant for his forthcoming book, *From the Skyscraper to the Wildflower: Charles Gilbert Hine's Photographic Survey of Broadway* (Columbia University Press, 2025).






