PhD Candidate Nyari Chisaka has been awarded the Graduate College Ballard and Seashore Dissertation Fellowship for Spring 2025. She will use the spring semester to finalize her dissertation, "The experiences of women during the Second Chimurenga: The case of women in Murehwa."


Eric Zimmer (PhD, 2016), whose new book Red Earth Nation:




